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Why is the "c" (in "church") on our signs at the building not capitalized? n both of our signs at the building, one by the street and the other on the building, the "c" for "church" is not capitalized. Someone asked, why is that? Here are a few of reasons: First, the word "church" is never capitalized in any version of the Bible except one - that I could find – and that's the New Catholic Bible. Capitalizing the word "church" fits Catholic doctrine of the primacy of the church. We do not adhere to that doctrine. Second, the word "church," when used to refer to a single local church, like the church at Folsom, simply means "assembly." The Greek word is ekklesia and refers to the people who are called out of the world. Our decision to leave the word "church" uncapitalized is because we want to emphasize "Christ" not the church. Literally, we are saying that we are an "as-"...what we post on our signs is not Christ." Since "Christ" sembly of the

(Greek, *christos*, selves "assembly that same as "the guessing that if we ...what we post on our signs is not a title or a name but a statement of who we are." saying that we are an "as-Christ." be wrong, but I'm not sure anyone would ask why "assembly" is not capitalized.

Third, unlike the Catholic church and some denominational churches, we believe the Bible teaches that every congregation is completely autonomous, *self-governing*. We have no connection with any other church, no national or global headquarters, no associations, or "conventions." Capitalizing "church" can leave the impression that we are part of a system of churches or that we are assigning a title to the church (e.g., "Church of Christ) that may imply a connection with a central organization.

To summarize, what we post on our signs is not a title or a name but a statement of who we are — "the church [an assembly of people who believe in Christ] meets here.
